Motivation of more reluctant readers continued to be positive – in KS2 accelerated reader enabled us to target and tracked progress. Lock down had an impact on reading which was evident in the drop in outcomes in Sept 2020. This will continue to be a focus. Fluency groups supported children in confidence and mental recall. Again while teachers tried to maintain this during lockdown, it was challenging for pupil premium children again, it will be a focus of booster support in autumn 2020. Language and communication interventions increased confidence in EYFS. Strong school communication with families through daily teaching, daily Zoom meetings and regular telephone calls

Monitoring of lessons and learning in books	 supported children's mental health and wellbeing and enabled them to keep learning as much as possible during lockdown. Until school closed in March due to COVID, children continued to thrive through weekly drama which consistently lead to purposeful opportunities for writing. An increased focus on writing skills also supported the continued improvement in the quality of children's writing. Language and communication activities with EYFS saw identified show pupils increased engagement in whole class and group activities. Impact of readings groups was positive however school closure affected comprehension – this is an increased focus for Autumn 2020. Drama specialist supported home learning by creating videos and setting activities that children could engage with at home. We are however unclear of the take up of these activities as they were to boost confidence and promote language and

Pupil interviews	This happened in autumn 2019 and some of spring term 2020 with targeted pupils receiving additional one to one lessons to boost confidence and knowledge.
Attendance	Weekly attendance review followed up with communication with parents. Close and rigorous monitoring of attendance ensures that loss of learning time is minimal. Weekly school promotion of attendance and punctuality through awarding of school mascots.	£1679	Tracking progress Tracking attendance	Strong and regular communication with families as well as rewards systems to motivate pupils continued in the autumn and spring term until lockdown. During lockdown we monitored attendance at Zoom meetings and engagement with home learning. Concerns with engagement resulted in regular and consistent phone communication with families. In some cases if they were deemed to be vulnerable due to the difficulties in engagement, we offered opportunities to come into school during lockdown – this was taken up by some families and boosted engagement on days of home learning.
